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

Virtual Exchange

Technology-enabled, people-to-people education programs

- Context: Unprecedented interconnectedness
- Opportunities / threats: information silos or polarization
- ➤ Use of technology presents an opportunity to combine depth (dialogue) and breadth (technology) to establish more cooperative, and compassionate relations within and between societies.



Goals of Dialogue & Exchange



Cross-cultural communication & collaboration

Empathy, critical awareness

Engaging with difference constructively, curiosity



Soliya's Dialogue Model

- Sustained engagement
- Spaced learning
- Focus on synchronous exchange
- Small, diverse groups
- Semi-structured curriculum: compulsory activities and topics & free flowing dialogue
- Facilitated by trained, neutral and multipartial facilitators
- Learner-led process (ownership of content and process)
- Safe space that is also uncomfortable
- Exploring intercultural differences as well as power dynamics
- Meta-discussions: not just learning on content but on process

CINIECT PROBRAM"



The Connect Program

- Designed by Soliya, to be integrated into an existing curriculum or offered as an independent study.
- Participants meet on our exchange portal, exchanging for around an hour per week asynchronously and 2 hours per week through live sessions.
- Topics include: Values and social norms, stereotypes and cultural misunderstandings, gender, global/social inequality, digital world and communication, immigration/integration, environment, religion, foreign policy
- Instructors receive weekly reports detailing attendance, topics and exercises. Final student performance reports include detailed feedback and evaluation.
- Participants also receive a certificate of completion and get access to the Exchange Portal and its network of global alumni.
- Fully funded by the Stevens' Initiative for the United States and the MENA.



The Connect Program

- CONNECT GLOBAL for discussions framed around current social challenges and world events.
 Specialized Track Foreign Affairs.
- CONNECT COLLABORATE hones team-building and collaboration skills through project based learning activities such as an online awareness campaign developed to address a topic of current relevance.
- CONNECT EXPRESS encourages thoughtful discourse in a digital society and explores how
 identity constructs and assumed archetypes influence engagement across divides. Presented
 as an option for those participants or course with greater time constraints. 4 weeks




Global Circles

- Our open enrolment program with possibilities for university partnerships
- Short dialogue exchange: 2 weeks of synchronous and asynchronous engagement
- 1 round every month
- Free and open for participation in several rounds
- Bringing together participants from different backgrounds and countries around compelling issues that matter to youth today, such as new geopolitics and shifts in international relations, inequality and discrimination, new technologies and climate change.



Global Circles

- Current topic: Rethinking humanitarian action in a world of crises
- Upcoming topics:
 - Social media: a blessing or a curse?
 - Social change through citizen initiatives
 - Diagnosing and solving global poverty and hunger crises
 - Metaverse and virtual life implications for our relationships
 - Changes in employment (global, remote, gigs, etc.), creative and digital economies
 - Climate change and biodiversity should we prevent or adapt?
- Participants learn from and with each other through discussion-based activities.
- Each group has two trained facilitators.
- Combination of structured topics and open discussion.





Global Circles

I experienced a feeling I haven't felt before and it shocked me in a good way. Being able to express myself comfortably, knowing that the others were listening actively, and understanding my ideas felt amazing.

The conversations organically evolved as we learned more about each other and our sometimes surprising similarities, all while respecting our cultural differences. We were able to quickly build a meaningful and supportive rapport that helped us through the difficult discussions.

I learned that borders aren't just drawn on maps but in our heads. In order to overcome the real borders that surround us daily, we have to overcome the mental barriers first by challenging stereotypes and talking directly to everyone.

1st Year Connect

- Focused on one campus
- Designed to equip incoming students with the skills to successfully engage in difficult conversations on controversial topics.
- Can be integrated into an existing orientation program or a required course to connect incoming students from the same college or university.
- Students meet for 8 hours of synchronous online engagement, for instance during the summer or winter break.
- Teachers are also encouraged to train, be part of the program and often end up using this methodology in their class for other activities.
- To date, 1YC has been piloted with over 500 students.



1st Year Connect

JANUARY 2021 - COMPARATIVE PRE & POST PROGRAM

"I have spoken or acted to promote awareness about an issue related to discrimination."

• 15.53% increase in students saying they "agree" or "strongly agree"

"I have challenged media misrepresentation of other groups."

 21.81% increase in students saying they "agree" or "strongly agree"

"I am confident that I can produce work with people from other backgrounds."

 8.13% increase in students saying they "agree" or "strongly agree"

FACILITATION TRAINING PROGRAM



Facilitation Training

- 2 courses: basic (10hrs) and advanced (20hrs)
- Heavily focused on practice, feedback and experiential learning
- Pedagogy based on conflict resolution methods
- Learning to:
 - Actively listen, summarize, reformulate
 - Make observations, ask critical thinking questions, model and encourage active listening
 - Nurture perspective giving and taking
 - Be neutral and multi-partial process leaders not dialogue participants
 - Be comfortable avoid conflict

"I participated in the Connect Program during my first online semester while we were in lockdown. A big chunk of my history course was a part of it. Seeing people from all over the world sharing their lockdown experiences, and knowing that I wasn't alone, was very helpful during a tough time."

"Virtual exchange is very unique because study abroad programs can make one remain focused on oneself. Your environment is different but you remain in your own bubble. This can actually make you more attached to your perspective. If we talk about immigrants, we talk with family and friends who will share similar views. It is different to talk about immigration with immigrants or hear the perspective on immigration from American peers."

"It was super interesting to have dialogue sessions with people coming from the U.S. and Libya. I learned about gun control rules in the U.S. for the first time and the challenges Americans face against gun violence," she says.

"I took an interest in conflict resolution and dialogue, and became a trainer for intercultural groups. I realized my passion for volunteering."

"International dialogue is different from our day-to-day conversations and debates."

"There was no censorship or manipulation, unlike social media where this is likely to happen. People were vulnerable and without masks. The focus was on learning; there was cultural context and mutual respect. The facilitators made sure everyone was engaged. They challenged us and guided us with questions."

"I made a life decision to change my major after participating. Now, as a digital organizer, I assist low-income households in getting access to publicly funded health and food assistance programs."

"It was fascinating to realize how little we are aware of international perspectives and what the policy implications of the decisions our leaders make at home are on other countries."

"Learning how to be an active listener in digital mediums was a major accomplishment for me. Letting myself be quiet for a minute. Prioritizing listening to the stories of other people."

"I learned by experience how it's so difficult to humanize from just textbooks; hearing and sharing personal stories was really interesting and very valuable."

"I always had international curiosity but those opportunities were lacking at Morgan State. It is a predominantly black institution, my peers are black, and there are only a few international students. The Connect Program really filled that void and allowed me to meet with international students around the world."

- "In the beginning, internet connection was an issue. Not being able to see or hear them at times was frustrating. But that made me realize that not everyone lives in a country where wifi is accessible everywhere. It put into perspective how people lived and how I lived. I learned to take the time to be patient with my international peers."
- "I learned how to be a listener, first, before reacting. As architects or designers, we must be listeners."



Soliyo Measuring Impact

Efficacy is measured and evaluated using pre- and post-program survey tools developed by Dr. Emile Bruneau of the Annenberg School for Communication at the University of Pennsylvania and formerly of the Saxelab Social Cognitive Neuroscience Laboratory at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Longitudinal impact studies are conducted in coordination with the University of Oxford and University College London.

Measuring Impact

Our Findings

- Can virtual intergroup contact approximate physical contact?
- Is virtual exchange symbiotic with physical exchange?
- Can lasting learning be seeded through virtual exchange? 🔽

"Virtual contact is not only an alternative to direct contact; virtual interactions could be used to enhance or maintain the effects of direct contact before or after the initial experience. Soliya's Connect Program illustrates 'virtual contact' as a new effective type of intervention that could dramatically expand the scope and extend the reach of intergroup contact, and achieve broad change in intergroup perceptions and attitudes."

Fun

- "best learning experience
 I've ever had"

Friendship

- Conversation 2 hours per week
- "The best part was the genuine friendship we formed"

Challenges

• Student schedules: meeting their group outside of class time

- Group dynamics:
 - Lack of consistent participation from some group members
 - Participant technical issues

- Emotional arc of participants
 - Hesitance -> confusion -> engagement -> excitement

Veteran students and Soliya

"Being in the military and going to war I have always had a negative reaction to Middle Easterners. Having engaged with students from that side of the world, I have been able to let my guard down and create a friendship with the students."

Skills for STEM majors

"When applying the skills to the health field, I feel that being able to really listen to the patient, hear how they are feeling are essential in asking follow up questions regarding their symptoms and working towards a particular diagnosis."

Skills for students in the legal field (immigration)

"I wanted to let you know that the Soliya program has really helped with my job.

I feel like it has let me have more of an open mind with these kids who are coming from other countries and who tend to experience culture shock.

I have a better understanding of what they have experienced, which lets me build a better relationship with them so that I can better assist them."
